3rd ANNUAL MEETING



The third annual meeting of the FMSA was held on Saturday, October 29th at the Deland Airport. There were 22 in attendance when the meeting was called to order by President Max Elliott. We were pleased with the turnout since we were in competiton with the FL-GA game and many of our members were still recovering from Hurricane Wilma in So. Florida. Only 5 classes lacked representation, and Ms. Alda Earp represented the faculty. She was presented with a framed picture of FMS shield and her photo from an FMS annual, for having faithfully attended all three years.



The meeting was once again held in Steve Nash's hanger. Two new board members were announced, Asa Dean (1960) and Lee Hansen (1963). Those attending received an FMS 2006 calendar prepared by Harry Silvis and a handout outlining the Golden 50th General Information and Event Planning. The events were discussed and volunteers were solicited to act as event or gather coordinators.



Treasurer Thorton Ridinger reported that contributions received will facilitate the continued publishing of the newsletter up to and through the 2006 Golden 50th Anniversary Reunion and will help fund the Golden 50th planning activities. These contributions have allowed FMSA to function without requiring dues or membership fees.

Major Dinkins Found FMS When It Found Him

The year 1959 was a good one for Chaplin Dinkins. He'd just earned his bachelor's degree in Education at the University of Florida and landed his first teaching position without even looking for it.



"The university Personnel Department had a job placement service," the former FMS instructor explained in a recent interview. "Colonel Ward called there looking for prospective instructors. They gave him my name and he called me."

One thing quickly led to another and Chaplin Dinkins became Captain Dinkins. "I was young. I was right out of school. I was trained and I wanted to work. To me it was a challenge," he recalled.

He began in February, 1959, teaching 9th grade civics and English and taking up residence in Howard Hall. After his first year on the job Florida education requirements changed and he switched to teaching cadets American and world history.

The school fit the new instructor and he fit it. "During the 1960's Florida Military had many talented, creative and dedicated faculty and staff members and I enjoyed working with all of them." And the cadets, many of them in the earlier grades, warmed to the captain's easygoing manner.

But all life situations change. After nine years of teaching and a promotion to Major and commandant of Allyene Hall, Chaplin Dinkins knew the time was at hand to prepare to assume responsibility for the family farm and garden business his grandfather had begun.

Both he and Major Pendarvis resigned from FMS in 1968. "I taught history at Sanford Naval Academy for two years and then took over Dinkins Service Store in Dunnellon in 1970," he said. He is the third generation of his family to own and operate the retail store in the north central Florida town. He runs the business with Mary Virginia, one of his two sisters.

"I live a quiet life," he reflected. "I enjoy gardening and going to movies. I also do a lot of volunteer work for my church."

And does he ever hear from any of his former FMS students? "Oh, yes!" he said with obvious pleasure. "Every year some of them will stop by to see me."

Treasurer's Report for the 2005 Annual Meeting.

Following the annual meeting in October, 2004, \$2,359.01 was received from our former Treasurer, Andy Staley.

During the past year, we had 7 donations totalling \$2,815, and sold one directory for \$5.00

On the debit side, we printed four newsletters for a total cost of \$1,208.73. Also, we spent \$100.00 on NASCAR Archival Research expenses, researching the FMS - NASCAR connection. The annual corporation fee of \$61.25 was paid to the State of Florida, and \$44.20 was spent for postage for mailing information and newsletters to newly found alumni.

The bank balance, at the time of the annual meeting, was \$3,764.83. This amount should enable us to carry the work of the Association through the Golden 50th Reunion and to provide a first-class gathering that will make everyone proud. It's going to be an exciting time.

Your financial support is very greatly appreciated and we intend to recognize our donors at the reunion.

October 2004 - we had approximately 520 on our mailing list. This number does not reflect those identified as deceased, or lost.

Another more recent search has produced another 25 cadets and faculty. We ran out of time but have very definitive leads on most of the faculty members. We will be following up on these leads in the near future. There are also a stack of cadets to be called, and we have been experiencing a high rate of success. Our only limitation is time. We can only make calls in the early evening or on weekends, so as not to interfere with meal hours, church times, or work. We will continue.

A big problem has been the number of people we lose every time we do a mailout. People are moving and forget to update their information with us. Since we get approximately 30 returned on each mailing, we no longer remail their newsletter. Rather we update their information in our file and they get the next mailing. At \$.37 per newsletter to remail, it was draining our resources too quickly.

At present (October 2005) – our total mailing list is now approximately 613, not counting those we have lost or who are deceased.

A master list of anyone who ever attended FMS is in the process of being compiled. At present, through the help of Harry Silvis, who entered names for many classes, a rough list has been compiled. Now we are attempting to cull out and consolidate duplicate entries of the same person with different names, or hometowns, etc. Then all staff and faculty members will also be entered.

It is hoped that as part of the 2006 Directory, a copy of the completed master list can be included. The 2006 Directory will possibly be altered to include only a minimal biography, but Geographical and Class listings will still be included.

Hopefully when we mail this issue out we will not have as many "returns" as we have had for the past issues. Max updates our mailing list just before every mailing but still there are those who

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move or change their address in some way and their newsletter gets returned.

Golden 50th

General Information

Florida Military School officially opened in the fall of 1956 with a total of 63 cadets in attendance. The year 2006 will mark the 50th year anniversary of the opening of Florida Military School. "Golden" is the term used to denote the 50th event of a series. We are calling this reunion the Golden 50th Anniversary Reunion, or the **Golden 50th** for short.

The Golden 50th will be held at the Holiday Inn in DeLand Florida on the first weekend in August 2006 – Friday the 4th, Saturday the 5th and Sunday the 6th. (Please note that the Holiday Inn has said they will offer the special rates to those who wish to come on Thursday the 3rd and to those who wish to remain until Monday the 7th.)

Check-in will be held in the Holiday Inn lobby 1-5pm on Friday afternoon and 9-12 on Saturday. After that, check-in instructions will be posted. The Stetson Suite (6th floor) will again be used as our Hospitality Suite. The Suite will be mainly for socializing since we have obtained a large room on the main floor for static displays, videos and Harry's Store.

Friday will be mainly self-directed activities. There will, of course, be gatherings in the Stetson Suite as well as on-going presentations and displays in various designated places at the Holiday Inn. Their pool, restaurant, and lounge will be available. They will offer a special "early bird" Friday night in the restaurant and Cash Bar on the pool deck from 5-7pm. Downtown DeLand also hosts a number of fine shops, restaurants, and activities.

On Saturday, in addition to the on-going presentations, displays, and gatherings, various organized events will be scheduled. In planning are Historical Tours, River Cruise, Shopping Tours, etc. A pool party is also planned for Saturday afternoon. Saturday night will be the informal dinner/dance held at the Holiday Inn.

On Sunday morning, at the Holiday Inn, we will have our breakfast and FMSA meeting. There will be door prizes and raffle drawings. Following the meeting, the 50th Golden Anniversary Reunion will wind down and come to an official close, although you may wish to participate in other local activities throughout the day (or even Monday - remember the Holiday Inn will extend our special rates through Monday).

Event Planning

At 9 months out from the Golden 50th, this represents the current status of the events in planning. The Holiday Inn, which hosted us for our 2002 reunion, has been instrumental in our overall planning process and invaluable for the events occurring at the Holiday Inn itself. In addition to facilitating the presentations, displays and gatherings, they are providing maximum support for the Pool Party, Ghost Tour, Dinner & Dance, and the Breakfast Meeting. Of course, the Holiday Inn Rhythm Street Lounge will also be available to us for other get-togethers.
