A big supporter of the FMSA left us Thursday, October19, 2006, when Thomas "Tom" Sperling died at home.

Tom, 78, had been in and out of the hospital during the past month, due to heart trouble. He came home for the last time on Monday, October 16, and died three days later with



family members gathered around him.

Tom was instrumental in getting us many of the items needed for the 2002 Lollapalooza, and for getting permission to erect our Memorial plaque on the brick columns on Yorktown Blvd. at the Deland airport.

Tom Sperling as hired as the first Parks and Recreation Director for the City of Deland in 1961. Prior to that, he was athletic director and head football coach at FMS.

Tom also arranged for FMSA to have space in the Deland Hospital Museum for our FMS Museum. He and Bill Dreggors worked hard to give FMS its rightful place in the local history.

#### Introduction

The meeting was called to order by Max Elliott, President, who gave the welcome and presented the board members. He discussed the events of the Golden 50<sup>th</sup>. All who attended seemed to really enjoy it.

Steve Nash informed us of the recent death of Tom Sperling (Faculty). Tom was one of our greatest supporters. The Lollapalooza represented the personal touch of Tom. He arranged the use of the hanger, the caterer, the entertainment, and much more. Tom was also the benefactor of our FMS museum space. He was loved by many and will be missed by all.

#### Reports:

Thornton Ridinger presented the FMSA financial report and status of the Museum. He presented the results of our recent audit. Thornton said that contributions have offset the debts from the reunion and will enable us to continue publishing the newsletter for the next 24 to 30 months. His report will be published on the FMSA web site, in the next newsletter, and the information will be made available to members upon request. Thornton also discussed the future of the FMS museum. It was decided to move the research items to the West Volusia Historical Society and to store the other items. Once again, the contributions will allow FMSA to function



without requiring dues or membership fees.

Thornton, and other representatives of the class of 1959, said that they would coordinate the next official FMSA all-class reunion in 2009, which will also commemorate the 50th reunion of their graduation. It would be held in DeLand and the Holiday Inn will be contacted next week for a rate quote. It was also noted that all Association sponsored activities will be open to all members. Any class-specific activities, as in the past, will be the responsibility of those classes participating. Current plans are to have a special event for the first four graduating classes, possibly the day before the general reunion begins.

Sue Elliott gave the Secretary's Report. She discussed locating members we have never found. In response to questions about another FMS cruise, she said she would try to find out how many were interested for one in 2008.

Harry Silvis (1965) gave an overview of his products and emphasized the DVDs that he has compiled from various films donated by members.

#### Special Report:

The Class of 1965 conducted special recognition ceremonies for E. J. Jones and David Raulerson, Jr.. E. J. Jones was presented an engraved sword, furnished by FMSA, to honor him for his efforts at the 50<sup>th</sup> reunion. E. J. was the one who picked up and paid for the sword to be raffled off at the reunion. E. J. was given a check by FMSA to reimburse him for what he paid for the sword.



E. J. drew the winning number in the raffle for the sword. Then E. J. donated the sword back to FMSA for the auction! The sword was bought at the auction by Bob Green.

After being presented the sword, E. J. then presented FMSA with the original, un-cashed reimbursement check from FMSA. Thanks E.J.!

The Class of 1965 then presented, in absentia, an engraved sword, furnished by the Class of 1965, to David Raulerson, Jr., in honor of his father, a deceased cadet (1965). David was unable to be at the ceremony, due to travel difficulties.

#### Open Floor:

During the open floor, Robert Mouro stated that a planning meeting was held in Jacksonville at the Mussallem Galleries for an event to be held in Jacksonville sometime in 2008.

He said it was his understanding that Charlie Mussallem (1969) was interested in FMSA working on a book of the entire history of FMS, from inception to closing.

An independent group said they were going to study the condition of the FMS sign and entrance columns.

#### **WEST POINT CADET SWORDS**

Are what became the "official FMS Sword." They normally cost \$245.00. We have found a direct importer that has them currently on special for \$159.50 mail order or \$143.55 if you pick it up at the warehouse in Conyers, GA. The company is Atlanta Cutlery Corporation, 2143 Gees Mill Rd., Conyers, GA 30012. 800-883-0300. Fax 1-770-388-0246 - www.atlantacutlery.com The p/u price when all is said and done is \$153.60. The internet price delivered by UPS is \$180.00+ depending on your location. Choose a size 28", 30", 32", 34". You will save money framing the 28".

When you receive your sword, if you choose to have your initials engraved on the disk what you need to do is contact the oldest jewelry store in your city and ask them if they can still get hand engraving on metal. A yes, will cost you between \$25-\$50 for your initials. (I paid \$2.00 each in 1964)

If you do purchase one from them please drop a check with some of the money you saved to FMSA, to use for the newsletters.

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#### STUDENT RECORDS

A while back, some of the guys wondered if there were any remaining records from Florida Military School. Others were interested in obtaining copies of their transcripts or diplomas. I started by calling the Florida Department of Education offices. learned that many of the department offices use answering services but never return calls. When someone actually answered, I was referred to yet another office. After many months of frustrating attempts. I sent an email to the Commissioner of the Florida Department of Education. surprise. I received a response from the Office of Independent Education & Parental Choice stating they had been asked by Commissioner Winn to respond on his behalf. What they said was that when private schools close, the records are transferred to the local public school district. If the records are not transferred, they are considered lost.

I called the Volusia County Superintendent of Schools and was referred to Archives and Records Management. They said that there were records from Florida Military School in their files. That is all they would tell me. One would have to fill out their form — Student Records Release Authorization — and attach a check for one dollar to receive transcripts or proof of graduation. I did that and a couple of weeks later received my check back with a form letter which said "NO STUDENT RECORDS"

FOUND." I am now waiting for a call back from Archives and Records Management so I can ask more questions. I'll keep you all posted on this saga.

Like the proverbial phoenix, the FMS entrance pillars have once again arisen. Thanks to the concerted labors of Jeff Fawsett '60, Steve Nash '65, Terry Hollingsworth '66, Lee Hansen '64, David Scarborough '65, Dennis Eyre '59 and Pete Bulat '66, the missing pillar is now restored to its former state. For those who might not remember, FMSA placed a memorial plaque on the pillar at the 2002 reunion. Late in 2005, a semi-truck failed to negotiate the turn onto Yorktown Rd. and demolished the right pillar that held our plaque. While we were worried that someone might steal the plaque, we never imagined that someone might actually mow it down the column.

The idea for the restoration grew out of discussions at the 2006 reunion and the 2006 FMSA Annual Meeting. This entire project was spearheaded by Jeff Fawsett, Dennis Eyre and Steve Nash and done with donations of time and money. Jim Lucas '66 started the financial donations off at the Annual Meeting and soon others (Jeff Fawsett '60, Terry Hollingsworth '66, Bill Parrish '61, Gary Aitken '60, Thornton Ridinger '59, Steve Nash '65, David Scarborough '65) joined in.



Despite this show of support, at last count, the group is probably well short of the monetary support that had to be put forth. Finding the matching aged bricks was a major project that was successfully handled by Terry Hollingsworth. The bricks alone were \$390, not to mention the cost for 75 concrete bocks, 19 bags of concrete, 39 bags of mortar, plus wood for forms and 7 pieces of rebar, and not to mention the scores of other minor items necessary for this huge undertaking.

Roger Davis, our neighbor next to the site, who also has allowed us to restore the school sign on his property, was also instrumental in the success of this project. He donated storage space for the materials as they were collected and ferried in over a period of several weeks and a most important factor, a source of water.



Professional guidance was provided by Terry Hollingsworth, who brought Bogdan "Bo" Bladek, one of his employees, who was the only paid worker on the job.

Max & Sue Elliott and Steve and Sydney Nash provided housing and nourishment for the "Worker Bees". Several of the guys arrived Friday night and spent the night at Max & Sue Elliott's guest house in Pierson, so that they could get an early start on Saturday, November 18<sup>th</sup>. The others joined them in the frosty hours of Saturday and the work began.

The pillar slowly began to take form as the clear, sunny day progressed.



By sundown, after much toting, mixing and hauling, when darkness forced the work to stop, the column was nearly two-thirds of its original height.

Several of the "Dirty Half Dozen" headed to the Pierson guest house, and after a congenial meal of Chili topped off with warm apple pie a la mode over



at the Elliott's hit the sack. The others retired to a warm meal and warm bed at the Nash's. The weary bodies were soon ready for rest. Not being accustomed to this extreme, physical work, several wondered if they could even move, yet they managed an early start on another frosty morning.

Brick by brick, and soon the full height of the column was reached. The cap stones were the next step. The smaller ones were formed and poured at ground level, but the larger, bottom one had to be formed and poured in place.

Bucket after bucket of cement was mixed and wearily lifted to the platform as this was done.

Before the two other cap stones were placed, a time capsule was prepared and placed inside the column. Photos of the column, a narrative and photos of the cadets involved, plus other items about FMS were sealed into a capsule that was carefully set under the final cap stones.



As the day began to wane, the final two cement caps were hefted into place.
